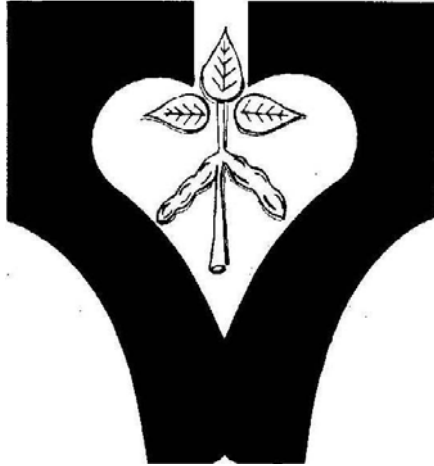

2011 Fair Association Rules

Ticket Prices and Classifications

- **Season or Exhibitor Pass** - This entitles each holder access to the grounds throughout the fair and entitles the holder to exhibit in open class. All open class exhibitors, except for beef, dairy, and swine, must have a pass. Advanced passes will be sold at all Schnucks stores, the 4-H Center office, and the Extension Office-Darmstadt. Beginning July 25, season passes will be available at the fair office and gates.
- **Single Admission** - (Children 9 and under are free). Available at gate only. Single admission tickets are \$5 each.
- **Association Membership** - \$20 entitles each holder to a fair catalog, exhibit privileges for the 2011 fair, a notice of Association meetings, voting privileges in fair business, and access to the grounds throughout the fair. These may be purchased before March 31, 2011 from the fair association secretary.
- **NO REFUNDS** will be given for admission.

- Dogs and/or other animals are not allowed on the fair grounds unless they are a service dog, or animals in a show or contest.
- No illegal drugs, firearms, or alcoholic beverages are allowed on the fair grounds. All vehicles, packages, parcels, diaper bags, purses, backpacks, etc. and persons are subject to search.
- No public display of advertisement materials such as business logos, company names or product displays, etc. may be on the fair grounds without prior permission by the Fair Executive Committee and/or Fair Association.

The Association will carefully preserve all articles while on exhibition but will not be responsible for any losses or accidents that may occur.

- Items or products exhibited must be created or grown by the exhibitor.
- **Entry times may have changed** - check your particular department requirements.
- Home and Family Arts, Farm Products, and 4-H Exhibits should be removed between noon and 2 p.m. on Sunday, July 31. Premiums are paid at that time.
- Check with the livestock superintendent for health requirements.
- Straw must be furnished by the exhibitor.
- Premium checks are distributed by the superintendent of each area. All checks must be cashed within 60 days.
- Judges shall not award prizes to unworthy exhibits, whether there is competition or not; not shall they award premiums on articles incorrectly entered or incorrectly named.
- In any emergency, the matter will be left to the discretion for the Fair Board.
- All season passes must have the exhibitor's name printed on the pass to exhibit in Open Class.

VANDERBURGH COUNTY FAIR TALENT CONTEST

- The Talent Contest is scheduled during the Vanderburgh County Fair in the Auditorium. The Vocal and Instrumental categories will be Friday, July 29, 2011 starting at 7:00 p.m., and the Dance, Novelty, and Tumbling categories will be Saturday, July 30, 2011 starting at 12 noon. Registration will start one hour before the contest begins.
- Pre-registration is required for all acts. Please review all the rules and regulations below before completing your entry form. Entry forms may be obtained online at www.vanderburghcouthair.com. Each entry form must be complete and signed by the person entering the act and the rules must be observed or it will be disqualified.
- All entries must be postmarked by Friday, July 8, 2011. Mail entries to:

A fee is \$7.50 per person, per act, must accompany each entry. Checks should be made payable to the Vanderburgh County Fair Association.

Rules and Regulations

1. Every contestant in the Talent Contest must be an Indiana resident.
2. Contestants are limited to entering in one individual and/or group act in the competition, but also may perform an exhibition number.
3. The Vanderburgh County Fair Talent Contest consists of three divisions:
Junior Division: 12 years or less of age
Senior Division: 13-21 years of age (If you are 13 years of age anytime during 2011, you must enter in the Senior Division.)
Exhibition Division (See Rule #6)
4. Group Acts must compete in the division determined by the ages of the majority of the members of the group. No one older than 14 may compete in the Junior Division. The Exhibition Division is for those ineligible for Indiana State Fair Competition because of age, out-of-county residence, or at the chairperson's discretion, and is not eligible for prizes.
5. Those contestants (Age 9 and under) from other counties may enter in group competition providing a majority of the group is from Vanderburgh County in the Junior Division. Contestants ages 10 and over must be a Vanderburgh County resident or belong to a Vanderburgh County 4-H Club to participate. Contestants over the age of 9 who live outside Vanderburgh County must show their 4-H membership card at the registration table prior to the contest. All others may participate in the Exhibition Division.
6. Groups or individuals may perform in exhibition without being judged if they desire. Contestants performing in exhibition may also participate in the judged category of one individual and/or group act if eligible. There is no age limit when performing in exhibition since this category is not eligible for state competition.
7. Entries will be accepted in the twelve categories listed below. Winners will be



eligible for the Indiana State Fair in both the Junior and the Senior Divisions. In the event that fewer than three acts are entered in any one category, the chairperson reserves the right to combine it with another category.

Use the following descriptions as a guideline for selecting in which category you register to participate. No changes in category will be made after July 8, 2011.

Vocal Solo-Female/Vocal Solo-Male: Shall consist of a solo performance by a vocalist. Instrumental accompaniment by herself/himself or others is allowed, but must assume the pure character of accompaniment. The test shall be whether the performance would stand alone if the accompaniment were removed. Any background vocals on tape must be minimal. If composition is written by performer and wishes this judged as part of the act, it should be placed in the novelty category. No props allowed.

Vocal Group: Shall consist of a performance by two or more vocalists, male and/or female. Instrumental accompaniment by themselves or others is allowed, but must assume the pure character of accompaniment. Any background vocal on tape must be minimal. No props allowed.

Instrumental Solo/Group: Shall consist of a solo instrumental performance by a male or female without vocal utterance. Accompaniment is allowed, but must assume the pure character of accompaniment. The test shall be whether the solo performance would stand alone if the accompaniment were removed. No instrument of the same nature may be used for accompaniment. No props allowed.

Dance Solo: Shall consist of a solo performance by a male or female dancer. Accompanists are permitted on stage. Acrobatics (with a limit of two tricks), ballet, pointe, tap, and jazz will be judged in this category. Vocal performance by a solo dancer will not be judged in this category. Props must be part of costume.

Dance Group: Shall consist of a performance by two or more dancers, male and/or female. Accompanists are permitted on stage, but must not assume visual importance in the performance. Acrobatics (with a limit of two tricks), ballet, pointe, tap, and jazz will be judged in this category. Props must be part of costume.

Novelty Solo: Shall consist of a solo performance by a male or female in any act that has not been otherwise described (such as comedians, mimes, skits, etc.). This category will include acts using a combination of skills from two different categories where one skill does not stand alone (such as singing and dancing, playing an instrument and singing, lip synching and dancing, and the use of props). Hand carried props only. Limit of two acrobatic tricks.

Novelty Group: Shall consist of two or more performers, male and/or female, in any act that has not been otherwise described (such as comedians, mimes, skits, etc.).

This category will include acts using a combination of skills from two different categories where one skill does not stand alone (such as singing and dancing, playing and instrument and singing, lip synching and dancing, and the use of props). Hand carried props only. Props must be used as an integral part of the act. Limit of two acrobatic tricks.



Tumbling (Free X Only) Solo: Shall consist of a solo performance by a male or female tumbler. This category was created for dance routines that incorporate more than two acrobatic tricks. Everyone is responsible for his/her own mats and runners. Two persons per mat may place mats on stage. No props allowed.

Tumbling (Free X Only) Group: Shall consist of two or more tumblers, male and/ or female. This category is for group dance routines that incorporate more than two acrobatic tricks. Everyone is responsible for his/her own mats and runners. Two persons per mat may place mats on stage. No props allowed.

Clogging Solo/Group: Two or more cloggers are considered a group. The same terms and conditions as for other categories apply to clogging. No props allowed.

8. Cheerleaders and baton twirlers or similar acts using batons, machetes, or sharp instruments will not be accepted in the contest. No fire, dry ice, straw, or confetti will be allowed on stage. Your act will be disqualified if this occurs. These acts can perform in Exhibition.
9. Tumbling moves/acrobatics are as follows: one split, one cartwheel, round-off, flips, and aerials, etc. (each considered as one trick).
10. Props are determined as anything that is hand carried and not considered to be part of the performer's costume; (ie. hats, canes, etc. are considered a part of the costume).
11. All contestants must furnish their own accompaniment (live or recording).
12. Contestants must furnish all costumes and special properties required for their act. The public address system and a piano will be furnished. Contestants will be responsible for lost, stolen, or damaged equipment.
13. Names of contestants will be announced as they appear on the entry form. Each contestant's home address should be listed on entry form.
14. All acts will use only the sound system and sound operator provided by the fair, however, instrumentalists may bring their own amplifiers, if needed. All music must be on cassette tape or CD (good quality), cued, correct side marked, and labeled with act's name and address. Be sure only competition song is on the tape/CD. A representative of each act must take the tape to the sound operator and the same person must pick it up. All contestants should bring a back-up tape. Mis-cueing of the tape will result in a penalty deduction of 10 points.
15. Set-up time for all props, instruments, mats, etc. is two minutes. An act must run no longer than three minutes. Tear-down time is one minute. An official timer will be present. Timing begins A) when music begins (when music is used), or B) at first movement or vocal utterance of performer without musical accompaniment. All music must end within three minute limit. Ten penalty points will be deducted if time exceeds limit. Disqualification after thirty seconds over limit.
16. Winners will be selected by impartial judges. Decisions of the judges will be final. Interpretation of the rules will be at the discretion of the Talent Contest

Chairperson, whose interpretations are final. Any grievance or question about the Vanderburgh County Talent Contest must be mailed in written format to: Vanderburgh County Fair Association, P.O. Box 58, Inglefield, IN 47618 no later than August 5, 2011. All grievances will be answered. **Anyone who verbally complains to the judges, chairperson, or emcee will be disqualified and will be ineligible for next year's contest.**

17. Contestants and parents/guests must pay to enter the fair grounds.
18. Awards will be presented to all participants. Prizes will be awarded as follows:

1. Each contestant must be at least 16 years old and can not have had her 21st birthday as of August 19, the first day of the 2011 Indiana State Fair Queen Pageant.
2. Contestants are to attend an introduction meeting on July 5, 2011 at 6:00 at the 4-H Center Expo Hall. Picture will be taken at this meeting for display at the fair. **(Your personal entry form and picture are due at this meeting.)**
3. A contestant must be an Indiana resident, a U.S. citizen, and represent her home county. One of her parents or legal guardians must also be an Indiana resident. The only exception: she may reside in an adjoining county if the majority of her activities are in the county in which she enters the contest.
4. Contestants cannot have a child or be knowingly pregnant at the time of the county fair queen pageant or the State Fair queen pageant. If the 2011 queen becomes or is pregnant anytime during her reign, she will be required to relinquish her title.
5. Each contestant must be an active member of at least one worthwhile organization in her community, such as church groups, Girl Scouts, 4-H, etc.
6. No professional model is eligible for the State Fair Pageant. (A professional model is one who earns her livelihood by modeling). A contestant who has had training or schooling in the modeling field, has been paid on occasion for modeling, or who works for a fashion board is not considered a professional model.
7. Any contestant who has competed in a State Fair queen pageant cannot compete again and cannot compete for the title of Miss Vanderburgh County.
8. The contestant will be judged on the basis of poise, personality, and the ability to converse. At the county level, the judging is divided into five divisions: speech, interview, professional wear, evening gown, and on stage questions.
9. The requirements for each division include:
 - Speech* - Three minute speech about self. (Contestant t-shirt provided for contestants and denim skirt, shorts, jeans, or capris.)
 - Interview* - The contestant will answer impromptu questions in front of the judges. (Suit, dress, pant suit, or pant separates)
 - Professional Wear* - Suit, dress, pant suit, or pant separates. Suit does not have to be of same fabric, separates will be allowed. Attire worn by contestant for interview may also be worn/ judged in professional wear category. Props are not allowed.
 - Evening Gown* - Long evening gown, at least one portion of the evening gown's hemline needs to be floor length (touching the floor or the contestant's foot). The evening gown worn for the preliminary judging must be worn for the public pageant.
 - On Stage Questions* - The contestants will answer an on stage, impromptu question during the evening portion of the pageant.
10. The Vanderburgh County pageant will be held on Monday, July 25, 2011. Preliminary judging will occur during the daytime. The public pageant and crowning will be held in the evening at the fair.
11. The winner of the Vanderburgh County pageant will be crowned "Miss Vanderburgh County 2011" and must be prepared to spend from July 25 to July 30 at the fair.
12. The winner of the Vanderburgh County pageant will compete August 19-21, 2011, at the Indiana State Fair pageant. The winner of the state pageant will be crowned "Miss Indiana State Fair 2012" and will be the hostess of the 2012 State Fair.
13. Points and score sheets are for judges' assessment only. Final selection is the judges decision.
14. All contestants of the Miss Vanderburgh County Pageant are expected to work in the Banquet Hall on Friday, July 29, 2011. Work schedule will be assigned.
